
The Korean Conflict: The Forgotten War

"Forgotten" b/c it occurred right after World War II and right before the Vietnam War. The Korean War often gets overlooked.

Origins

Korea was invaded and ruled by Japan from 1910 until 1945

After WWII, Korea was split into two -North (USSR) and South (US) at the 38th parallel



1949 Truman "loses" China


- Mao Zedong leads Communist Party to victory in China.
- Many in the US blamed Truman.
- United Nations recognizes Taiwan as legitimate government (home to Mao's Nationalist opposition.)



Korea Divided

- Soviet Union installs a communist government in the North
- US is sympathetic to/supports the South.





"Domino Theory": The idea that if one nation in a region fell to communism, others would follow like toppling dominoes

June 1950, North invades South

Pink = Area occupied by Communist forces

Blue = Area occupied by UN forces




United Nations Response

- Recall, the permanent members of Security
 Council wield decision-making power
- Soviet Union boycotting UN
 - Due to UN decision to award
 Taiwan UN seat for China
- Result of Sec. Council vote: UN to intervene



The Shifting Map of Korea [1950-1953]





Nov. 1950, China jumps in!

- Pushes US/South Korean forces out of the North
- UN/US counter-offensi ve



The 38th Parallel

- Original dividing line of North and South Korea
- US and Chinese reach a stalemate near 38th parallel in 1951



1953: Year of Decision?

Negotiated Peace

Settlement reached:

- Korea to be divided along 38th Parallel
 - North Korea will remain communist
 - South Korea will remain capitalist
- De-militarized zone (DMZ) along border



Results




- North Korea devastated by war
 - 2 buildings left standing in Pyongang, a city of 400,000 people
- US lost 54,000 lives
- Total lives lost over 2 million!

TODAY

- Most heavily fortified border in the world
- US troops stationed in South Korea
- North Korea has acquired nuclear weapons
