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

Welcome to Sport in American Society!

Excited as you may be to be taking a history course on sports, let's talk a bit about what this class is and what it isn't.

First off, it is NOT going to be talking about last night's game, rattling off sports stats or talking about our fantasy league teams for 60 minutes a day.

Instead, we're going to be talking about sports and why they matter to us. It is undeniable to say that athletics have become intertwined with almost every facet of American life & culture. Sports permeate so many aspects of our society today - from the news to daily conversations to the celebrities we follow and even the clothes we wear; sports are integral to so many aspects of our society.



The value in studying sports...

One of the major underpinnings of this course is the assertion that a study of sports is valuable for more than just entertainment. Yes, sports can be fun to watch & talk about. Sports are ALSO a reflection & transmitter of social norms, values, conflicts & progress in American history. Most major social, political & economic issues are reflected in sports.

Consider some of the biggest issues in American sports today: whether it's a debate about the validity of esports or the question of whether college athletes should be paid, issues regarding gender inequality, the debate over team mascots, or the question about whether athletes should be allowed engage in political protest, each of these issues is about more than just sports. Each of these topics can be broken down and explored more deeply.











Over the course of the year, we'll cover topics like...

- The roots & psychology of fandom
- ★ The current debate over trans athletes taking place in many states
- ★ Mascots
- Sports gambling
- Evolution of sports & leagues
- Boston's complex sports history through the lens of race
- The ongoing debate over payment of college athletes
- ★ Women in sports
- The many ways sports are marketed, branded & sold
- Activist athletes



All of these topics can't be divorced from the history & events happening in that time so you will need to draw on your knowledge of the various decades of the 20th century (no worries though, we'll review the relevant details at the start of each unit!)

My goals for you:

To build critical thinking, writing, research & organizational skills.

To give you a space to learn more about US history & culture through the lens of sport.

Specifically, the questions we'll be exploring this year are:

- ★ What can we learn about America through American sports?
- ★ How are sports a reflection of society, including its values & conflicts?



















Google Classroom set up




Classwork:

Aspen




Aspen use:

- ★ Please let me know if you see anything that doesn't line up with what you think you've handed in.


Remind (texting)


★ Remind is a texting app that's geared for educational use. Each class has its own texting group, which allows you to text me when you have questions


Writing
